Mr. Vice-President Honourable Ministers, Excellencies, One worry is the twin-headed monster of late-entry and early dropout. In East Asia and the Pacific, two-thirds of children enrol late. Yet travel west and the challenge is retention; in certain parts of South Asia, a slim majority of students complete primary school.

Why? Look no further than the many children who graduate without basic proficiency in reading, writing and math.

Poor education results cannot simply disappear. Just ask one of South Asia's nearly 400 million illiterate adults.
