Given that, those sanctions imposed pursuant to arbitrary and politically motivated determinations of the notion of threat to the peace and security and based on

euphemism to cover the most inhuman and brutal instrument of foreign policy to punish nations for their perseverance and determination to insist on the right to self-determination and political independence. No decent person can delight the sufferings and grievances of the fellow human beings caused by sanctions, call it 'smart', though it acts 'dumb'.
