Within the ECOWASub-region and under the chairmanship of H. E. Nana Addo Dankwa Akufo-Addo, President of the Republic of Ghana, Member States inue to work closely at all levels of intergovernmental process on border surveillance, information gathering, intelligence sharing, early arning system, capacity building and mutual legal assistance on criminal matters including ansboundary crimes.

Togo in response to growing insecurity linked to violentextremism in the region is an important counter terrorism framework designed as acooperative and collaborative security

mechanism built on three pillars of information and intelligersbaring; taining of security and intelligence personnel; athe conduct of joint crossorder military operations

This and several other efforts through regional initiatives and coalitions reinforce the importance of strengthening partnerships between the United Nations and regional bodies for holistic, inclusive and effective counterterrorism measures.

Despite repeated commitments by the international community to undertake concrete measures to eliminate terrorism and violent extremitenrorist groups continue to beemboldened in their actions as a result of beinogoded through several formal and informal channels Financing terrorism is antithetical to our collective goals to promote international peace and security, protect human rights and seek the development of our people therefore call upon Member States to intensify efforts to suppress and counter terrorism financing

I wish to conclude by emplaizing that nilitary strategies alone are not sufficient addressing the scourge of terrorism valid and international efforts to eliminate terrorism would be better advancethrough a strategicalance between economic development priorities and security priorities. This requires taking into account he needs of the people while rethinking the role of the state and its section sity tutions in responding to emerging threat soft power options aimed at supporting stable democratic governance, descing inequalities, creating opportunities and redistribution of wealth provide a repertoire of measures that go to the roots of the problem of terrorism.
