With this study, the Commission will finalise its systematic consideration of Article 38(1) of the Statute of the International Court of Justice, which has been a valuable exerciser Member States so far.

Australia also reiterates that the standard for the identification used cogens norms in draft conclusion 7 should be acceptance and recognition by the international community of States as a whole.

Finally, Australia meains doubtful of the utility of the nonexhaustive list referred to in the Annex to draft conclusion 23. Australianuld have preferred the Commission have addressed in the commentaries a limited number of establisheous cogens norms using the methodogical approach established by the draft conclusions.

Australia reaffirms itsupportfor the call for States, pursuant to their obligations under international ka, to take effective measures to enhance the protection of the environment in relation to armed conflict and welcomesthe guidanceby the Commission of additional measures that States could take to further that objective

Respect for existing internation humanitarian law can limit the impact that armed conflict can have on the natural environment and the populations that depend on it.

Australia encourages all States to take concrete measures to enhance respect for international humanitarian law rules **peo**ting the natural environment, including the dissemination of these rules and their incorporation into military manuals, and national policy and legal frameworks.
