

United Nations General Assembly | Sixth Committee Report of the International Law Commission (Cluster II) 27 October 2022

Mr. Chair,

Moving to the second luster of items discussed the report of the International Law Commission, Brazil would like to deliver some remarks regarding the topics contained in Chapters VI and IX, namely: (i) immunity of State officials from foreign criminal jurisdiction; and (ii) sealevel rise in relation to international aw.

Brazil has been following with attention the work of the Commission thetopic of immunity of state officials from foreign criminal jurisdiction. I would like to thank the Special Rapporteur, Ms. Concept Escobar Hernández, for her contribution on the matter, and commend the Commission for the adoption of the text of the draft articles on first reading.
