On the subject of the Annual Report of the International Law Commission, today I would like to address the topic of "Sea-Level Rise in Relation to International Law".

Mr. Charperson,

Bulgaria aligns itself with the statement made by the European Union. I will now make some remarks in our national capacity.

Bulgaria closely follows the work of the International Law Commissionon this topic sinceit was included in its programme of work in 2019. As last year Bulgaria made a statement on the topic of "Sea-Level Rise in Relation to International Law" this year we would like to make some additional comments based on the current work of the Commission.

It is Bulgaria's understanding that the Convention enshrines a very delicate balance between states' rights and obligations. Consequently, when the Commissionis reviewing state and regional practice or *opinion juris* on the topic in order to formulate conclusions, it should take into account only the practice, which is in line with the relevant principles and provisions of the Convention.

In addition, it should be noted that the Convention does not contain a legal obligation for state parties to regularly review and update their baselines and the borders of their maritime zones, established in accordance with the applicable
