In closing, the Nordic countries would like to reiterateconcern over the threat that piracy and armed robbery at sea pose to the global economy and safety of seafare including through the human cost of them being taken hostage or kidnapped, as well a over the violence employed by pirates and personseithiropiracy and armed robbery at sea.
