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Introductory Observations

Seventy-Seven years after the Nuremberg trials, and over a century since the adoption of The Hague Conventions, the international community faces a pivotal moment with the opportunity to reach a new milestone in the common fight against impunity: a Convention governing the prevention and punishment of crimes against humanity. No such globalConvention currently exists "unlike with respect to genocide and war crimes.
