Our work over the past years has shown that, while much progress is being made,

There will be ample opportunity for dialogue to share experiences and exchange views on good practices and lessons learned in high-level roundtables and interactive expert panels. Many parallel events organized by Member States, United Nations entities, non-governmental organizations and other stakeholders will further enrich our work. Regional review meetings have taken place under the auspices of the UN regional commissions, and their outcomes will also enhance our discussions.

The Commission should result in a renewed commitment of all stakeholders for

the full realization and implementation of the Beijing Platform for Action at all levels. It should immediately start the process of practical and concrete action that place gender equality and the empowerment of women firmly at the centre of the very important intergovernmental processes that will take place later this year. And in particular the ECOSOC Annual Ministerial Review in July and the High-level Political Forum on Sustainable Development in September, which will focus on accelerating progress towards the achievement of all the Millennium Development Goals by 2015.

We must seize all opportunities of national, regional and global level to give impetus to the promotion of gender equality and women's enjoyment of their human rights, and build the strategic partnerships that will help us move forward
