Interpretation Summary

Mr. Chairman

On the occasion of this fifty-fifth session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW), my delegation has the opportunity to focus on the priority and review themes presently under consideration. Due to time constraints, I have chosen, with my colleagues, that the official full text be circulated.

The principles by which educational agencies, institutions and schools operate must be firmly rooted in a profound respect for the dignity of man with full recognition of his cultural values.

Values rooted in the natural law common to humanity play a key role in the proper education of the human person. Those who receive an education become members of society who can properly choose and pursue that which is good personally and communally and avoid that which is not good for the self and for others. Primary education should focus on basic skills and it must fully respect the primacy of the parents regarding their education, especially in, but not limited to, the area of human sexuality.

Mr. Chairman,

The true advancement of women requires that labour should be structured in such a way that women do not have to pay for their advancement by sacrificing what it is essential for them and at the expense of the family; in which women and men in their human vocation are the foundation and cornerstone of the United Nations Organization rightly point out, the family founded on the marriage between a man and a woman is the natural and fundamental group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society, cannot be separated. (cf. Universal Declaration of Human Rights, Art. 13,5, International Convention on Civil and Political Rights, Art. 23.)

Mr. Chairman,

All States must enact and enforce legislation to protect girls from trafficking and exploitation, from conception onwards, including abortion, especially sex-selective abortion, female infanticide.

Mr. Chairman,

Taking up the issue of human trafficking, we would like to emphasize the importance of effective laws to bring about justice and to end to this heinous crime by addressing significantly the

denied, and combat trafficking in persons by strengthening laws against prostitution of children and adults, child pornography and sexual exploitation.

• **Feminist advancement of women**: In this, with full respect for the dignity and worth of all persons, such legislation must take into account the entire life cycle - from conception to natural or natural death - and States have the responsibility to ensure this in their national legislations.

Mr. Chairman,

The authentic advancement of women necessarily entails recognition of the deep fundamental truth of gender in this dual and world-wide reality, upholding both dignity and the truth of the body, the well-rooted and profound diversity between the masculine and the feminine which is the source of our common humanity, and the call to "labor and to communion. The more we respect this truth of human nature, the more we will be able to confront the challenges which we face today and assist them, so that there may be authentic advancement around the world.
