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Mr. Chairperson,

Excellencies,

Distinguished Delegates,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

On behalf of the Thai Delegation, it is my great honour to address the fifty-fifth session of the Commission on the Status of Women. The delegation of Thailand would like to align itself with the statement of the Group of 77 and China as well as the statement delivered by Indonesia on behalf of ASEAN.

I first and last to reiterate my delegation's opportunity to congratulate the United Nations Commission on the establishment of UN Women. It represents a strong statement of intent to accelerate the achievement of gender equality and the empowerment of women.

Mr. Chairperson,

I also take this opportunity to reaffirm Thailand's commitment in the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action and the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women. Thailand reaffirms its commitment to achieving the Millennium Development Goals with respect to promoting women's education and realizing gender equality. This year's theme is indeed central to these important development goals and supports our ultimate aim of realizing a gender-equal society.

Mr. Chairperson,

The Thai policy has always consistently reflected our belief that education is one of the crucial factors that contribute to a person's social success and well-being. In this regard, the Thai Government has spared no effort to ensure universal access to education for all in accordance with the goals of our Constitution and the National Education Act. With respect to ensuring equal access to education for women and girls in particular, we have already achieved the MDG in eliminating gender disparity in education.

In the specific area of science and technology, Thailand has taken many important steps to 1) eliminate traditional perceptions which have held back women and girls from achievements in science and technology; and 2) to encourage the participation of women and girls in science and technology both in the education system and through training exercises and pilot projects.

To name a few:

- The Ministry of Education, with support from UNESCO, has developed tools to eliminate gender bias. In addition, various seminars and training sessions targeting education officials have also been conducted to raise awareness on gender equality.

- The Ministry of Science and Technology, in cooperation with ITU, leading Thai universities, recently launched the *Technology Women Project*. The purpose was an opportunity to transfer and share experiences as well as to provide consultation on science and technology.

Approximately 60 percent of the total number of participants in this project were women and girls.

- On a yearly basis, the Science and Technology Assembly Development is held to promote participation of all sectors, especially women, in the area of science and technology. It is also an important forum that provides its input to the National Plan on Science and Technology.

- Furthermore, the Office of the National Research Council encourages women and girls to pursue higher education in science and technology by granting awards to those who distinguish themselves by conducting exemplary research on these subjects.

Mr. Chairperson,

The Thai government is well aware that its commitment to promoting equal access for women and girls to science and technology must be realized over in rural, urban, and remote areas. Since 2002, the Ministry of Information and Communications Technology set up ICT community learning centers totaling 879 centers all over the country, ensuring that women's participation in the operational functions of the centers was guaranteed in establishing these centers.

At the regional level, Thailand has also exerted great efforts as one of the major drivers of the Empowerment for ASEAN Home-Based Workers Project which aims to increase the competitiveness of female home-based workers through the use of ICT.

Mr. Chairperson,

Thailand appreciates the fact that promoting access and participation of women in the field of science and technology is crucial. However, Thailand also understands that it is merely one part of what must be an integrated and comprehensive strategy to promote gender equality and the empowerment of women. We are also very aware that access and participation of women in the field of science and technology has a direct, positive and mutually reinforcing impact on promoting women's equal access to full employment and decent work. In this regard, we have also spared no effort to promote the latter, with Thailand's Labour Protection Act regulating equal pay for equal work, specifically labor associations, their struggle, Employment and protection against discrimination such as sexual harassment. In addition, the Thai government has launched specific programmes for women in enterprise schools, child care centers at places of employment, breast feeding projects, and "maternal centers" for small and medium-sized enterprises run and operated by women.

Mr. Chairperson,

My delegation is pleased to share with you all our experiences and experiences and we have been equally pleased to listen to the statements and interventions of all participating delegations here at this session. CSW. Still, we are aware that a number of challenges and obstacles certainly remain that are unique to our own cultures and those that persist at the international level. We must continue to discuss and to share our experiences and to find opportunities for further cooperation and coordination. For today, my delegation can only reaffirm our strong and consistent commitment to continue to work with our partners here in all sectors, both at the national and international levels toward our ultimate goal of gender equality. In closing, I do wish to express our confidence, once again in the CSW, and sincerely, established UN Women, and hope that we will continue, together, to make important strides toward our common goal of gender equality and empowerment of women.
