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3 Oral Statement by the Young Women's Caucus on priority theme 2011:

4 Access and participation for women who are in technical training, science and technology, including the promotion of women's equal access to full employment and decent work

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6 *The young women's caucus at the UNCSW conference third year at the United Nations to bring together the voices of girls and young women around the world. This year supports young NGO representatives and representatives of UN agencies to facilitate the participation of girls and young women to coordinate advocacy efforts and policy statements.*

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10 We, as members of the young women's caucus, call on governments and the international community to ensure equal access and participation of girls and young women to education, training, science and technology, including young women's equal access to full employment and decent work by 2015.

11 Increasingly recognizing and young women's in policy making, including reliable and inclusive educational approaches that empower young women and create educational learning opportunities;

12 Facilitating access to technical training, mentoring programmes and job markets in science and technology;

13 Increasing investment in research, evaluation and education and training for girls and young women, especially comprehensive sexuality education, as key to addressing poverty and gender inequality and promoting the social, political, cultural and economic empowerment of women;

14 Recognizing and utilizing budget NGOs to support a national and local education programmes for girls and young women, especially in the development of educational and economic policies at the local and national levels.

15 Including a rights-based approach to education policies to address gender and socio-economic inequality in a learning environment;

16 Creating safe environment for girls and young women;

17 Demanding the right to full and voluntary informed consent when access to decent work for young women and determining this right in their economic growth policies, occupational legislation and poverty reduction strategies at national, regional and global levels;

18 Promoting vocational and non-formal education programmes that reach out-of-school girls in a safe and inclusive environment and their right to comprehensive sexuality education and information on HIV;

19 And reaffirming education as from Right to Well-being ends and young women to claim the full enjoyment of all Human Rights;
