The Republic of Korea welcomes the adoption of Security Council landmark resolution 1820 which calls for the immediate and complete halt of sexual violence in conflict zones. We also recognize the progress of the "Say No to Violence Campaign" conducted by UNIFEM and encourage all Member States and civil society to join the "Say No" campaign.
